Mediterranean Treasures, the title of the cruise said it all. Venice to Istanbul, cruising for 14 days on the Mediterranean, through 5 countries, calling into 14 places all dating back many centuries, with many of them having played important roles in world history. What an adventure!

Well, why not go a little further? Let's start in London, there's sure to be some great shows, ballet or threatre. A trip 13 months in the making, all planned down almost to the last detail, what could go wrong?

Di and I set off all prepared for the 13 plus hour flight from Singapore to London after the flight from Darwin and a four-hour

stopover in Changi. What we didn't plan for was the extra four-and-a-half-hour delay in the Changi Airport. We learned that our Airbus A380 had experienced technical problems. Oh well, Changi Airport is quite a good place to kill eight and a half hours and it was much better for us for the plane problems to be discovered while it was on the ground.

The flight delay meant that instead of arriving at early morning, we were treated to midday traffic in Central London on a week day. Almost two hours after leaving Heathrow, we found ourselves outside our hotel, Page 8, which is located next door to St Martin's of the Fields and not far from Trafalgar Square.

We were both ready to sleep but determined not to succumb until the evening. What to do? Let's explore, after all its June, summer in the United Kingdom. Well, everything we witnessed indicated that it was summer, but what we felt suggested something else. We discovered that in summer, Londoners, and tourists from around the world, stand on the footpaths to drink at the pubs and eat al fresco, under heaters. Not our style, please we will have a table inside out of the cold.


Great visits to art galleries, the National Portrait Gallery was opposite our hotel, and the usual tourist spots,

For those of you who are yet to experience a city on water.... everything, well almost everything, is by boat and much to our amazement, we discovered that water taxis only go to designated stops.

So, despite having booked an airport to hotel transfer, we found ourselves on a boat landing some 300 metres from where we wanted to be. That distance, pulling heavy suitcases over very rough cobble stones, was challenging enough, but the bridge that lay between us and our hotel made the journey even more daunting. A bridge, nine steps up and nine steps down. We thanked our good fortune for several young, generous folk who happened along and manhandled our suitcases over the obstacle.



During our 24 hour stay in Venice, we pondered on the huge variety of exquisite Venetian glassware on offer and tried to comprehend the vast history of the city. We also found tourists, from all over the world, abound as do steps, stairs and bridges. We also discovered that gondola and water taxi rides can be fun, particularly when the waterways are very busy and your chauffeurs have comical bents.







After a leisurely breakfast at water level watching the gondolier apprentices prepare the vessels for a day's work, we whiled away the morning, strolling around the centre of Venice wondering at its past and its architectural masterpieces such as St. Mark's Basilica and Doge's Palace.

Then we indulged in one of the Venice must dos, a gondola ride.

Ignoring the cruise transfer that had been booked, we chose to arrange a water taxi through the hotel which, to our delight collected us, and our heavy suitcases, from a landing pier at the hotel reception, saving us from another 300-metre trek pulling our suitcases. 
