

# **Probus Darwin—Travellers on the move**

#### Darwin to Europe and back

This article reflects a trip Di and I took to Europe in May. Given there is little unique about what we did I decided to produce a travelog with a difference. It includes observations of people, behaviours and places, my view of the good, the bad and the ugly.

Paris in 2023 wasn't much different to my memories from the late 1990s – crowded tourist places, awful traffic, and "interesting" parking practices. It is still a mystery how Parisians manage to park their cars into such small parking spaces and

at such challenging angles. We did the usual things, Hop on Hop Off bus, Eiffel Tower, Arch du Triomphe, and the Louvre. A notable difference for me from when I was in Paris the 90's is the way Leonardo da Vinci's masterpiece in the Louvre is viewed today. The visitor queues are still very long but visitors don't gaze in wonder of the art but rather view the Mona Lisa from a backwards perspective - a selfie pose. Another phenomenon is visitors standing in the Paris traffic for a selfie with the Arch du Triomphe.

We both greatly enjoyed Moulin Rouge complete with its incredible costumes and acts. We learned later we were one of the last audiences to see the snake lady's water act as, because of animal welfare concerns, it has now been banned.

We had a cold, wet day for a visit to the Palace of Versailles. Along with the 17<sup>th</sup> century opulence of its garden and buildings, no wonder the peasants revolted,

came a signature lunch at the Ore Restaurant. Apparently owned by a renowned chef, Alain Ducasse. A three-course meal with





accompanying wines. The soup, initially presented as a smattering of bits in the bottom of a dish, was then submerged in green liquid expertly poured by wait staff. But we were all up for dessert which, despite its strange name, tasted very good. The sophistication of the meal was a little lost on most of us, although the wines accompanying each dish were good and well appreciated.

Towards the end of our 5 days Paris stay our hotel presented us with a new experience, a European Israel Economic Cooperation Conference which came complete with protesters and hyped-up security. We had a bird's eye view of the plain clothed secret service officers on the street below who clandestinely communicated with the colleagues and the hotel through their sleeves.

Then, during the bus trip from Paris to Amsterdam to join the river cruise, the next leg of our holiday, "The Paris Bogans" was created,

21 fellow Aussies and two Kiwis. Our arrival in Amsterdam was quite eventful, with our bus blocked by striking taxi drivers protesting over a proposal to make the central city accessible to electric vehicles only. Much to our disgust we were forced to walk the last kilometre or so to the ship.

The river cruise took us to Rudesheim, Miltenberg, Wurzburg, Bamberg, Nuremberg, Regensburg, Passau,

Melk, Bratislava, Vienna and Budapest. We visited cathedrals, churches, palaces, museums, monasteries and viewed numerous world heritage sites. While all we did and saw were new experiences, some were outstanding.

Tour options in Rudesheim included Siegfried's Musical Instrument Museum, not attractive on paper but a great surprise. This is a collection of automated musical instruments which have been restored to working order and which provided



entertainment to our forebears. From automated musical contraptions complete with self-playing violins and the paper roll pianolas to the organ grinders organ, the only thing missing was the monkey.

The cruise took us though a multitude of locks along the Rhine and the Danube. This was a new and interesting experience. Even more interesting was the prospect of our



cruise ship not being able to pass under one of the bridges. Heavy, unseasonal rain and thawing snow had resulted in very high-water levels. At one point the captain increased ballast to sink the ship as low as possible, water was lapping the bottom of the windows on the lower deck, everything on the top deck were taken down even the bridge, that was on hydraulic rams, was lowered. Fortunately, our ship sailed

under a low bridge with five centimetres to spare which meant we were far more fortunate than others whose ships were stranded.

The best of Vienna were a cocktail party and private recital, by a full orchestra performing Mozart and the Strausses, at the Liechtenstein City Palace. A very memorable experience in an amazing venue which exuded opulence of chandeliers, sweeping staircases, marble statues and lots of gold.

During the 14-day cruise the Paris Bogans were privileged with two Captain's Table dinners with seven course degustation menus served in a private dining room. The dishes were prepared by an awesome Philippine chef and expertly presented by the maître d' from Myanmar.



My observations

This cruise holiday was great and understandably it was heavily focused on history, both ancient and modern. Many of the

"historic" structures we saw are modern versions of the original, rebuilt after the second World War with modern building materials. While the opulence of past European royalty and the Nazi war history were profiled, the guides paid little attention to the costs to the communities across the centuries. The guide in Nuremberg focused on the role that city played in the pre-war Nazi gatherings and the post war trials of key Nazi leaders with scant mention of what happened to the people. In the Castle District, the medieval heart and part of the Budapest UNESCO World Heritage site, our tour guide highlighted how the hill today is several metres higher than it was because the area housed the pre-war Jewish community and all the buildings had been reduced to rubble during the Nazi era. Many of the buildings, including the royal fortress of Buda Castle and Matthias Church, have been rebuilt and there are many under construction. I must ask, isn't there an incongruity to use history as a drawcard for tourists but gloss over the human impact?





Our ship experience was fantastic with the best of food, drink, and service. Our staff included several different nationalities, but many were from Myanmar. One incident during breakfast left those who witnessed it wondering. One of the Myanmar staff being "tutored" by a "Pommie" passenger for getting the jam labels mixed up. If you're one of the many who take cruise holidays, whether ocean or river cruises, please keep in mind those who make these holiday experiences so great often have English as a second language, spend long periods away from family and community and face difficulties both on the ships and at home.

During the cruise we discovered European wines, beyond those produced in France, and learned about grape growing and wine production in Germany and Austria. But, how the grapes are harvested from the vines growing on precariously steep, eastern facing mountain slopes, remains a mystery.

We were rudely awoken from luxury cruise by our flight home transiting through Frankfurt.

Never a fan of Lufthansa and German airports, in particular the Frankfurt airport, our experience this time has firmly cemented my opinion. A delay in our flight from Budapest to Frankfurt meant that many on the plane were rushing to catch their connections. We then

suffered a three hour wait for our luggage and, as a result, an additional waiting fee for our transfer to the hotel. Why the wait? Oh, in the haste to ensure other passengers made their connections, Lufthansa ground staff forgot to unload the luggage for Frankfurt. Just try to find Lufthansa customer service personnel in the Frankfurt terminal when you need one. Note to me – in future avoid Frankfurt airport.

Our overnight at a Frankfurt hotel was made very enjoyable by a wonderful Indonesian born German citizen, Stefan, who served us a lovely dinner and entertained us with stories of his migration to Germany.

Now we are back home with the memories of a great holiday with the "back to normal" challenges of deciding what's for breakfast without the help of a menu and then having to cook it.



#### Date, Oat and Almond Biscuits – Bev Aitken

125ml extra virgin oil ½ cup brown sugar

1 cup dates, thinly sliced 1 egg

½ cup rolled oats ¼ cup flaked almonds

¼ cup pepitas 1 cup plain flour

1 tablespoon chia seeds 2 teaspoons cinnamon


1 teaspoon carb soda

Extra ¼ cup each of oats, pepitas and almonds

for rolling biscuits.

#### Method

 Whisk together oil, sugar and egg. Stir in dates, oats, pepitas, almonds and seeds.
 Sift in flour, bicarb



- Cover bowl and refrigerate 30 minutes.
- Preheat oven 180° fan forced
- Line oven trays with baking paper. Combine extra oats, extra pepitas and extra almonds in shallow bowl.
- Divide mixture into balls. Roll balls in oat mixture gently pressing to coat, slightly flatten balls.
- Arrange on tray, about 4 cm apart.
- Cook 16 minutes till golden brown. Cool on trays.

Notes from Bev—can substitute almonds with macadamia nuts, don't need to roll the balls in extra mixture.
