- Commonwealth Senior Health Card some 15,000 self funded retirees gain access to cheaper medicines, bulk billing, GP appointments and other free or low cost health services.
- Aged Care—Pay boost for workers—Federal Gov announces \$11.3 billion over 4
 years with a 15% pay increase for aged care workers.
- Flu Vaccines—annual flu vaccinations available from you GP at no charge.
- **Budgets**—Federal main points (Seniors) \$2.2 billion cut to nursing homes over 3 years. Greater focus on in home care support. Electricity quarterly bills subsidised by between \$184 and \$350. Water and sewerage bills are also expecte to be about \$170 cheaper. Some savings in medical costs.
- Optus—great service and assistance from Optus at Gateway.
- Indigenous Language—There are over 250 different Indigenous languages in Australia.
- Laugh—we laugh less as we grow older and men laugh less than women by 27%






and Builder, responsible for many of the most beautiful houses in the city.

Liesel's Cherry Cake

100g butter

3 eggs separated

2 cups sugar

3 cups plain flour

1 dessertspoon baking powder

1/2 cup milk

2 cups cherries with liquid cornflour

Stir the butter, egg yolks and sugar until well mixed. Add the sifted flour and baking powder and the milk. Fold in the whipped egg whites gently. Put into greased pan.

For the topping—bring the cherries and liquid to the boil. Stir in the cornflour and thicken. Cool before adding to the top of the cake. Mix crumbs of flour, butter and sugar and sprinkle over the cherries.

Bake at 180⁰ for 40 minutes.

Makes a large cake.







In 1969 he served with PMG Radio Australia, Cobourg Peninsula. A discussion ensued about the kw power of the radio stations, the number of listeners and an earlier PMG working system.
