President's Report 2025

The end of yet another year of Fun, Friendship, Fellowship and must not forget Frivolity. At our age we are allowed to be silly and not take life too seriously. Speaking of age, it is interesting to note that the average age of our membership is 78.6 years, who would have believed it.

The Social Committee have, as usual, provided us with lots of venues in which to enjoy dinners and morning teas, breakfasts, for members every month. The night at Tims Surf and Turf was a highlight for me. It is unusual to sit at a table, enjoy your meal, and yet see people eating five or six other meals you wished you had ordered. A great place. In January, the social team decided to have a lunch instead of a morning tea, so some thirty of us descended for lunch at Dollys in Leanyer. A great success, expect more lunches in the coming year. The end of year lunch at Silks was enjoyed by a large number of people, attended by the Administrator and his Partner, and entertained by an energetic group of ladies waving feathers.

The Gardening club meets on the second Wednesday of each month and is something not to be missed. Of particular interest was a visit to the Deck Chair Cinema in August. We were given a talk on the history of the cinema and how the gardens surrounding the cinema were reestablished after cyclone Marcus. Well done Bev.

We celebrated National Probus Day on the 4th of October at Pearl Recreation Centre. This was a combined Probus clubs' event with skits performed by all four clubs, with Palmerston excelling by performing three skits. It was a great morning with five members of the government attending including the Chief Minister Lia Finocchiaro. Bill Roy provided the music, and Janet masterminded the whole thing with the able assistance of the Social Committee and Probus members from Pearl.

Being President for the past year has been both enjoyable and fun. However, this would not have been possible without the support and help of the Executive Committee, the Management Committee, and the coordinators of all the special interest groups who make being a member of Probus so rewarding. 




We visited Beijing and Kun Mun for 7 days in January. Here are some random



It was interesting to see people walking on the surface of a lake. In Beijing.

Tiananamen Square is still there and is the centre of Beijing in all respects.

Cameras, cameras



Very few young children to be seen – no babies sighted and no baby bumps – a real demographic problem for the Chinese Government. Young people aged 20 to 30 - we saw lots of woman/woman couples, and lots of man/man couples among the crowds, but only a few man/woman couples. Another sign of the demographic difficulty in

China.




Driving in traffic – if you leave a car's space between the front of your car and the one in front, a car from the lane next to yours will probably move into it. No road rage – everyone just accepts this happening.

Having a ride in a rickshaw.

Beijing office, commercial and residential buildings are mainly high rise – about 60/70 metres in height. However, one building was about 250 metres high. I have no idea why it was built that high.

Visited an aviation museum north of Beijing. There are millions of islands around the world but only one that I would easily recognise from the air, and there was an air to ground photo of that island – Rottnest Island off Fremantle in WA.

I sat down to rest my legs while visiting the Temple of Heaven in Beijing. A young lady approached me and indicated she would like to have her photo taken with me. Her



around and were getting ready to do the same. Perhaps they mis -took me for someone important. Do I look at all like our

Handsome Boy from Canberra? Seeing bronze age artefacts in a museum in Kun Mun, and a

small (20m metres long) replica of the dozens of huge three masted junks the Chinese built in 1413 to explore the unknown world, including Australia. Did you know that Kun Mun is the fourth largest city in China? Neither did I till I went there. It is about 200 kilometres north of the Thai border.

Travelling on a bullet train doing 350 kilometres per hour, then passing another bullet train going in the opposite direction, also

doing 350 kilometres an hour, and only a metre apart. Phew. Beijing to Kun Mun took eleven hours, and it was equivalent to Darwin to Rockhampton in Queensland. Or Darwin to Merredin in Western Australia.

Getting dressed – in Darwin, shorts, shirt, socks and sneakers if going informal. In Beijing, layers and layers of clothing, all enclosed by a long padded overcoat. And it was still an effort to stay warm outside.
