# **Probus Darwin—Travellers on the move**

During January and February this year I had a wonderful holiday travelling in Europe with my daughter and her family. Our travels began with a long journey to England, via Perth and Dubai with several hours spent waiting in airports. Recovery two days were spent in England then back to the airport for the next leg of the journey to Iceland in the hope of seeing the Northern Lights.

Our first day was spent looking around Reykjavik, walking through the snow and ice, trying not to fall over, looking at the Harpa Concert Hall, walking on the frozen lake and visiting the Church of Hallgrímur. The next day saw an early start to do an island tour taking in an erupting geyser, the frozen Gullfloss Waterfall and lava canyon. The sun didn't rise till around 10am so the light in the park was really eerie but very beautiful. Arriving back from the park we went to a geothermal pool—a wonderful experience. Unfortunately we missed out on the Northern Lights—there was too much cloud cover.

Back in England we spent a great week staying near Oxford, in my nephew's home, originally built in King Henry VIII's time and exploring the local areas as well as seeing some of the sights of London. One different activity was being part of the taping of an episode of Britain's Got Talent. That week sped by all too quickly and we then found

ourselves on the Eurostar heading across the channel to Paris.

First stop Disneyland and of course going on as many of the rides as possible through the day. Fortunately the queues were generally quite reasonable, and the Disney experience, as always was magical.

Our first day in Paris coincided with a marathon being run on Champs Elysee so we were able to experience seeing the Arc de Triomphe without cars—a whole different story once traffic resumed. We did many of the touristy things in a week—the Eiffel Tower, up to the top of the Arc de Triomphe, Sainte Chapel stained glass windows, a cruise down the River

Seine, the Wax Museum, champagne breakfast, and lunch at MonMarte, the Louvre, Musee d'Orsay, Orangerie Museum, a

ride in a hot air balloon and lots

of rides on the metros.

Then back on a train to Chur in Switzerland, ready to catch the Bernina Express across the Swiss Alps. This proved to be a beautiful journey—a lovely sunny day with the snow sparkling on the mountains and reflections in the rivers clear. A quick stop in Milan and finally to Venice.

Venice was in the midst of carnivale—lots of masks, costumes, confetti,

a wonderful vibrant place, but so many stairs on the little bridges over the canals. One place of great interest was the Leonardo Da Vinci Museum—full of his wonderful inventions, many of them interactive. It was really amazing

to see the breadth of his interests over a relatively short period of time. A gondola

ride rounded out our time in Venice.

Our next stop was in Perugia and an overnight stay at the Chocolate Hotel, its claim to fame being the breakfast buffet featuring all things chocolate - a truly amazing feast. Perugia is an old medieval town built with arched stairways and piazzas framed by churches and a reminders of the past including Rocca Paolina, a fortress built in the 1540s. Then on to Florence with its magnificent architecture, museums, gelato and leather. Caught the local bus for a view over the hills of Florence.

Our last train journey took us to Rome and more wonderful history with the Colosseum, the Roman Forum, the Pantheon and Trevi Fountain, the very extensive and beautiful gardens of Villa Borghese and the zoo which houses species of animals that are endangered. We ended our time in Rome with a fun

cooking class learning how to make fresh pasta and fillings then consuming our efforts for lunch.

Our European holiday over it was off to the airport for the long journey back to Darwin via Dubai and Brisbane. All in all a busy but fantastic time had come to an end.

# Probus Club of Darwin—outing to Adelaide River

Friday morning some 27 Probarians set off for the wilds of Batchelor and Adelaide River. After picking up a couple of rural dwellers at Coolalinga we were away. It is always nice to have someone else to do the driving and have the

elevated view of the countryside that a bus provides.

On arrival at Batchelor Museum, we were greeted by three very nice ladies, and made very welcome. We were shown around the area, which included a couple of dormitories. Lots of photos and stories of the Uranium mining which had taken place at Rum Jungle in the fifties and sixties. The accommodation appeared comfortable, for the period, although whereas the ladies had single rooms the men had to share. Lucky ladies.

We were then provided with tea and coffee and had a look around the admin building which was airconditioned. As we headed off one of our group was heard to remark that the ladies must have had a wow of a time with all those available miners.

Off to the Adelaide River Pub for lunch. Surprisingly the pub carpark was full of tourists, one would have thought it was the dry season. Reserved seating had been set up for us, very handy. The food was good and the service speedy. My fish and chips were excellent. After lunch we set off for the Adelaide River War Cemetery. This is truly an impressive place, so well set out and maintained. Lots of pictures and stories associated with the bombing of Darwin and other places during the second world war. One of our group, Elaine, who had lived in Stasinowsky Street in Darwin, placed a flower on the grave of Jennie Stasinowsky who was killed in the post office, and whom the street is named after.

This Memorial to Nurses (Military and Civil) on

Haynes Road, Adelaide River is close to the entrance to the wartime No 119 Australian General Hospital (AGH). The AGH was relocated from Berrimah shortly after the first bombing of Darwin in February 1942. Funding and placement of the memorial was co-ordinated by Janie Mason, Curator – NT Nursing Museum, Charles Darwin University.

The development of the Adelaide River township and area as a rear headquarters and logistics base was accelerated in March 1942. The

relocated AGH consisted of 22 nursing staff and 50 patients. Sidney Williams huts, tented wards and facilities were quickly provided. Shortly afterwards these



facilities were shared with the US Army Airforce and the pre-war cattle handling spur line was upgraded and a second line and siding built for medical evacuee trains.

Over the war period the 119 AGH area also accommodated the No 107 AGH and a number of associated medical units. To January 1945 the hospital rail siding

had over 160 ambulance train arrivals, carrying in excess of 11,700 patients. With hostilities moving northwards there was little need for a remote hospital and the area reverted to its pre-war use and was abandoned in the mid-1970s. Today only odd scraps of metal and the wreck of the ambulance train receiving station can be found in the undergrowth beyond the Memorial to Nurses.

The trip was fun, social, instructive, and invigorating, if a bit sticky, and fulfilled all the tenets that Probus is about.

Many thanks to Bronwyn and her team, for arranging it and thanks to Bronwyn for your informative and fun commentary as we travelled along, one would almost think that you were once a tour guide.


