
OW what a busy and fun Probus month this October was for most!!

Meghan Bailey Jade Neave

Meghan and Jade work with Menzies School of Health Research, in the Rheumatic Heart Disease team. Rheumatic heart disease is rare in most wealthy countries, but affects children in remote communities in Australia and in Timor-Leste at extremely high rates. Tragically, as a result of the disease, children can develop severe heart failure requiring open heart surgery, and sadly some die.

The current project is funded to mid-2025, and during the presentation Meghan, in the project management role, and Jade, as research assistant will share information about RHD and how the Menzies RHD research supporting communities to detect and treat Rheumatic Heart Disease.

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

Probus Darwin—Travellers on the move

The Spice Islands with Peter Siebert

When Coral Expeditions (Cairns) advertised a 'new diverse voyage to explore the Spice Islands and the fabled islands of Raja Ampat, through the Republic of Palau and the small remote islands of Micronesia'

(www.coralexpeditions.com/au/destinations/papua-new-guinea/darwin-guam-16-nights) – Darwin to Guam. I said to Libby 'this was the trip' – as it bought together several interests and curiosities which I had developed over the years.

Firstly – the Spice Islands – I sailed past Banda on my first DSC Darwin-Ambon yacht race ('Free-n-Easy' - John and Betty Wilkins) - my studies of the European search for easy access to the rich spices by the likes of Magellan (www.worldhistory.org/article/1872) and the later Spice War (www.youtube.com/watch?v=goJB07ixzhl) instilled an urge to 'eventually' visit this group of islands. In Ambon I visited the Gull Force WW2 cemetery (www.awm.gov.au/visit/exhibitions/alliesinadversity/japanese/ambon) and, as my father and an uncle had served, over the years I read about the Japanese and Allied conflicts in the region. A visit beckoned. Finally, a slide show by DSC yachties Roger and Claude Collins of their scuba dives in Raja Ampat, which they declared as the best reefs and fishes they had encountered, cemented the decision to book the voyage.





Away - 'Coral Adventurer' slipped at 0900 Tuesday 22 August from Fort Hill wharf. Soon after departing we all assembled in the Bridge Lounge for the safety brief, crew and expedition team introductions. The lounge was to become our 'second home' as all lectures, workshops, demonstrations, movies, daily recaps and precaps of the next day's activities were conducted in the lounge. Our cabin was on deck 4 where we had level access aft to the free seating Dining Room, the aft deck and stairs to the lower deck where the Explorers (landing craft) were loaded and lowered into the water. The two Explorers could accommodate all 90+ passengers.

Following Indonesian customs clearance in Ambon we were escorted into Banda Neira on Friday morning by two kora kora war canoes. Our first snorkel/dive was on the coral gardens regrown on the 1988 lava from the active volcano Gunang Api. After lunch we were welcomed by dignities and with local guides toured the Dutch colonial town—including the Belgica Fort. An early morning bird walk, village walk and climb up to the Hollandia Fort and nutmeg plantation finished our visit. My first mission accomplished! Continuing northwards we sailed to Misool Island in the southern part of Raja

climbing up a steep path for an overview and then snorkelling in

the pristine waters with colourful fish and corals we verified Roger and Claude's summation of the area.

The next day saw us in Sorong, capital of Southwest Papua, for a cultural morning with the local Moi Tribe dance performance, inspection of habitat conservation and witness the release of captured birds from the illegal animal trade back into the wild. Having dispensed with the 'tourist' bit we departed for Helen Reef, Palau (Micronesia) – crossing the Equator on the way. The reef is a submerged atoll with a small sand island in a large managed conservation marine zone. To disembark close to the sand island one of the ship's Explorer's led the ship in (this certainly was a groundbreaking 'new' voyage for Coral Expeditions!). Two rangers live on the island to protect the turtle breeding site and deter poachers. Snorkelling within the atoll was superb.

The following afternoon, Thursday 31st August, we went ashore to meet the 8 inhabitants of Sonsoral Island (www.sonsorol.com/history). Four of the locals guided us around the village and we discussed island life with them — truly tourism far removed from the 'standard way'! Overnight we continued onto Palau and in the afternoon disembarked for an afternoon bus tour of the Palau International Coral Reef Centre and the Belau National Museum. On this tour we learnt that the abundance of marine life has made Palau one of the world's premium scuba-diving locations. The next morning we were to observe this with a day of snorkelling — first amongst the freshwater jellyfish and in the afternoon in a magnificent setting where we went to three sites to observe giant clams; schools of colourful fish close to shore with



sharks passing through the schools and then an area with various corals and multiple fish species.

Another day at sea saw us at Yap where we spent the half the day snorkelling and then on a city tour visiting a traditional village and examining their collection of their stone money (rai), carved discs of calcite up to 4m in diameter (https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Rai stones). Although Yap was a Japanese naval base and air station during WW2 the installations which included underground fortifications were not seen because of the distance from town.

Early Tuesday morning 'Coral Adventurer' anchored off Mogmog Island, in the Ulithi Atoll. The Master (Captain Matt) went ashore to meet with the High Chief to request permission for passengers to visit and tour the village. We then landed and in small groups were shown the village and discussed lifestyle matters – very different to our lifestyle and interesting to learn about. No passengers opted to stay!

Our last shore excursion was landing on the uninhabited Soral Atoll. Under the guidance of a Soral Ranger we walked the beach observing monitors raiding turtle nests and devouring the eggs; waded in the shallows or engaged in bird watching. Later some transferred to an adjacent island for more bird watching.

Next morning, Thursday 7th September, we disembarked at Yap and flown by Coral to Cairns – no, we never got to Guam.....but that's another story. The ship's next voyage was to Toyko.

Update from the Darwin Probus Travel Committee

The committee has discussed a number of suggestions put forward by club members for travel in 2024 and 2025. At this stage they are being investigated for feasibility. Some suggestions include:

- Dili October 2024 experience (Timor Leste), looking at 4-5 days, possibly in March.
- Mudgee—too expensive and now off the list.
- Sri Lanka tour/cruise and Cambodia and Vietnam cruise/tour. These two activities are currently being investigated.
- Kununurra Full Moon Experience.



Bev watched the parade but I was a week behind her and ambled with my


grandgirls in the inaugural "Teddy Bears Picnic" parade..

He later sailed around Canada then North Africa then transferred to US Liberty ships until 1946. Soon after he came to Australia, worked for Red Cross in Victoria, involved in social welfare work amongst Aboriginals in country areas. He later settled in NT. In recent times he became involved in Youth Hostels both in Australia and internationally.
