Probus Darwin—Travellers on the move

Anne and Ed went travelling in Europe

Ed and I had a 5 week European trip recently. We enjoyed it enormously and were pleased that we stayed well, honored all our bookings and avoided pickpockets.

Before Covid we had booked our Scenic River cruise from Budapest to Amsterdam and it had to be used. We flew to Budapest and after 5 days joined the 14 day cruise then did a 14 day loop around Europe on the trains.

The river tour came with Business class airfares and they made all the difference. The pods we were in turned into full length beds and the meals came one course at a time. Singapore Airlines has a really good entertainment system so we were set. The only hard thing was to talk to each other as the pods are large and the seats set back. We enjoyed the airport lounges too.

I am sure many of you have been on a river cruise. On a typical day we had a full breakfast in the dining room at 7:30. By 9am we were heading off on our

excursion with water bottles, passes and phones in hand. We did the walking tours but there were hiking and cycling for the more adventurous. By 12:30 we would be back on the boat in time for a lunch with salads and hot foods. Then at 6:45 we headed to the bar for a drink and a review of the day (Port Talk) followed by a 3 course dinner and finishing with night caps and games. We had the stamina to keep up with this.

Our cabin had a balcony and the door between was permanently open making more room. Our mini bar was full of complimentary drinks and snacks. One couple had done the same cruise three times and they had lots of useful information. They explained how to pack the complimentary washing bag to maximise clothes in it with the roll, punch, rolling technique.

The Scenic Jasper travelled thru 98 lochs on the Danube, Main and Rhine rivers. Water levels were very low on the rivers but our captain steered well and we made it without needing to change boats. One night we could hear the hull scraping the river bottom. Scenic boats are marginally lighter and shallower than the competition and we were the only boat to get through.

Our excursions were varied. The light hearted Sound of Music show, a sobering visit to Nuremberg, an authentic German farm which also processed its own meats and took party goers out on moonlight carriage rides, numerous well preserved

old towns, the monastery in Melk built 1089 and Sigfried's mechanical music cabinet museum.


But all good things come to an end and we said goodbye to the cruise in Amsterdam. For a few days we suffered from post cruise syndrome where we found it difficult to do everything for ourselves again. One particularly smart thing we did was to leave our bigger cases in Amsterdam and we travelled very light on the trains. The cases were stored at a Tobacconist shop.

Our first train took us to Paris. The Eiffel tower dominates the city. The Parisians like to argue with each other and blow their horns. We caught buses rather than the metro as many stations were closed to upgrade them for the Summer Olympics. We found Monet's house and garden captivating. Ed decided Monet was a great gardener who could paint! We moved to Carcassonne and explored the medieval city which included the castle rampart walk, only adding another 500m and numerous stairs to the excursion. Our B&B host recommended wonderful restaurants with duck pate, rabbit terrine and a special steak.

It was back on the trains to Ventimiglia on the Italian riviera where we stayed in a B&B built many hundreds of years earlier. The grandfather was on duty at breakfast and we exchanged pleasantries and ordered coffee etc.

Then Ed asked him something off script and he looked blank and said he spoke only Italian, Spanish and German. Sign language works well.

We loved Zermatt in Switzerland with the Matterhorn towering in the distance and people walk rather than drive. A quick

look at the majestic old city of Bern and its colourful markets and there was just time for green sauce and schnitzel in Frankfurt. Our last night back in Amsterdam left us feeling very smug. Our luggage was on the trolleys for the next day, we'd bought a nice wine and set up properly for the room service. I laid out the water and wine glasses and filled up the ice bucket. We were all set for our long flight home via Singapore.

A few observations we made. People still smoke and vape throughout Europe. Wind turbines and solar panel farms are more accepted in Germany and Austria where people are paid to have them on their land. No payment happens in The Netherlands and it is a more controversial issue. Seed shops in Amsterdam are not for flowers or vegetables.

German efficiency does apply to their trains. Farmers markets in Ventimiglia and Bern had enormous varieties of fruit and vegetables as well as beautiful flowers, breads and deli goods. We found there were dozens of smaller varieties of tomatoes for sale all in a row. They were only rivalled by the berry varieties. In Bern we found an



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
