Timor-Leste

A huge vote of thanks from all the Timor-Leste travellers for the hard work and effort Janet put into the organisation of a great trip. All elements of the Probus motto were covered. Fun in enjoying the country and friendly people, laughs with fellow travellers, Friendship in getting to know club members in a different setting, Fellowship in mixing with the Rotary Club members we met along the way and finally, our extra motto, Frivolity in light heartedly becoming involved in all the activities available for us. Thank you Janet for making the trip so enjoyable.



We had 4 organised excursions—travelling along the coastline and into the hills surrounding Dili in mini buses and on one day troopies (needed for 4 wheel drive energy). Beautiful scenery, hair pin bends, small villages, friendly, smiling people, goats wandering freely along the road. We saw vast differences in the housing and living areas and people trying to earn a living. Local restaurants were a revelation, many with quite steep stairs which at times proved a challenge, but which generally provided interesting food and good coffee. We ate delicious red skinned bananas purchased from the roadside, experienced produce markets with beautiful looking vegetables and interesting spices. Our guides took us to churches, traditional housing, a cemetery and a guest house being renovated. We drove along a dry riverbed (the road was badly damaged due to landslide resulting from a huge rain event in 2021) and visited the area where the Pope recently delivered his address. Meeting President Jose Ramos Hortes was a lesson in how a person of huge importance can mingle . We were invited to the Palace, saw the school that has been up on the grounds and lunched in the same area as the students.
